Update on Projects:

Student Scholarships: The review of our student scholarship program saw the introduction of formal agreements with our students. Implementing these agreements in June 2017 achieved the Atauro community's objective of increased family commitment. It also provided wonderful opportunities for Indigo representatives to meet families and experience a new depth in relationships. At the same time improved organisation and communication with our student sponsors has improved these relationships.

Composting Toilets: The demand for composting toilets on Atauro continues to grow. The ongoing support for this "bricks and mortar" project in Indigo testifies to the value of this project.

Possible New Initiatives

School gardens and waste management on Atauro are areas important to building the capacity of the Atauro community. The support of both government and community groups in both Indigo and Atauro is strong for these initiatives. The Friends of Atauro are working with Timor Leste community groups Permatil and da Terra to encourage schools to develop vegetable gardens. O'Meara's hardware in Rutherglen and Yates seeds donated seeds for the school gardens.

Community Links

There have been important areas of confirmation and challenge in developing links between communities.

- Successful fundraising activities such as the Curry Night (Beechworth) and Atauro Challenge (Rutherglen) confirm the support of a sector of the community for the Indigo/Atauro relationship.
- **The new Youth Ambassador program** has chosen to support the development of school gardens on Atauro. This follows the strong connections the Junior Council developed with Atauro.

Incorporation of The Friends of Atauro

The move towards an incorporated structure for the Friends of Atauro as opposed to an S86 committee of Indigo Council presents challenges and opportunities. The challenge is to maintain the strong support of existing groups including the Indigo Council. At the same time developing a new structure that will be more flexible and one that has the ability to attract new supporters in demographic groups not represented at the moment. Greg Pinkerton from Indigo Shire has worked hard to develop a detailed Memorandum of Understanding between the new incorporated body (the final name is yet to be decided) and Indigo Shire. This memorandum plus the incorporated body's articles of association will detail how the new group will operate. 2019 should see the transition complete and the new organisation operating.

Finance

The Bank Balance at the end of November was \$19,120.32

The graduation of students, continued support of existing sponsors and careful monitoring of expenditure means that we are in a position to support two new students in 2019.

We thank all our sponsors both individual and group, on-going and one –off. Since the beginning of 2018 Alola Australia has tax deductibility status with the ATO.
